The organization we partnered with is The Eternal Companion (TEC) (CRA Registration Number 792058216 RR0001), a registered Canadian charity dedicated to providing aid to those in need. As Muslims, it is our duty to assist those facing hardship. The Prophet Muhammad (SAW) taught us, "الصدقة تدفع البلاء وتشفى المريض" - Charity repels calamity and heals the sick.

Currently, many in Lebanon are enduring severe hardships, including hunger, cold, and lack of necessities. Our school responded to this crisis with a compassionate and impactful fundraising initiative. The goal was set at \$7,000, and each class was encouraged to collect money in their own charity jars.

Alhamdulillah, in just two weeks, we not only met our goal but far surpassed it. Together, our school raised an astonishing \$54,000! This achievement was a tremendous honor and a testament to the generosity, dedication, and teamwork of our students, their families, and staff.

Initially, our plan was to include the names of all students who donated any amount in a draw, selecting one winner from each division. However, thanks to the incredible generosity of prize and gift card donors, we were able to select one winner from each class instead.

We also planned to reward the top-donating class in each division with a special lunch. However, given the overwhelming support and generosity of the entire school community, we are thrilled to announce that all students and staff enjoyed a special hot lunch on Tuesday, November 26th.

KINDERGARTEN JOURNEY: EXPLORING THE STORIES OF THE PROPHETS



- Prophet Nouh (عليه السلام): His tireless efforts to guide his people and the story of the great flood.
- Prophet Ibrahim (عليه السلام): His childhood bravery, destroying idols, miraculous survival in the fire, and his ultimate act of sacrifice.
- Prophet Moussa (عليه السلام): From his journey down the river as an infant to his triumphs over Pharaoh and the crossing of the Red Sea.
- Prophet Issa (عليه السلام): His miraculous birth, speaking as an infant, and healing the blind and deaf.
- Prophet Mohammad (صلَّى الله عليه وآله وسلَّم): His Israa' and Mi'raj journey, the Holy Quran, and the rewards of following Islam.

The students expressed their excitement and creativity by crafting prophet names and drawings inspired by each story.

BULLYING IS BAD, BUT DOES EVERYONE AGREE?



During the month of November, grades four to eight participated in anti-bullying workshops. Dr. Fatima led the sessions, starting with an engaging activity. For example, each student in grade 8 received two pieces of paper with different moral scenarios from Prophet Mohamed and his companions (PBUT) and were paired with a partner. Together, students discussed the scenarios and debated how we would handle these situations in real-life applications.


After about ten minutes of deep discussion, we took turns sharing our thoughts with the class. The overarching theme of the activity centered on not retaliating to violent or mean actions or words. While most students agreed that reacting violently is wrong, opinions differed on the appropriate response. Some argued that standing up for yourself—whether verbally or physically—was necessary, while Dr. Fatima emphasized the importance of walking away and seeking help from a trusted adult (i.e., teachers, parents, or the principal).

Next, we debated the difference between a bully and an enemy. Initially, many students thought they were the same. However, through discussion, we concluded that a bully operates on a smaller, more personal scale, while an enemy typically refers to a larger conflict, often on a militaristic or societal level.

The workshop continued with group activities centered around short stories that illustrated an example of bullying. We worked together to answer thought-provoking questions, reflecting on the story's lessons. By the end of the session, we gained valuable insights and wrapped up an enlightening and impactful anti-bullying workshop.

A ZIPLINING, CAVE-EXPLORING ADVENTURE

On Friday, November 1st, students from grades 7 to 10 embarked on their first field trip of the year to Arbraska Laflèche! It was the perfect blend of education and fun, as students transitioned from zipping through the treetops to learning about the formation of Caverne Laflèche. The group was divided by gender, with the girls starting on the obstacle course and the boys beginning their adventure in the cave. After a thorough briefing from the instructors, we eagerly strapped our carabiners onto the cold, sturdy metal wires. The group then split between the high-above-ground and low-above-ground courses. I chose the high course, where I experienced the exhilarating thrill of heights while hearing a mix of shrieks from students clinging on for dear life and the hollers of laughter from others confidently completing challenging obstacles. By the end, every student proudly earned their metaphorical badge of completion. We then returned to the "base," which was essentially a cozy snack shack. Students recharged with delicious treats, and some even generously treated their friends. Around 2:00 PM, we made our way to the helmet station before huddling at the cave's gloomy entrance. Following closely behind the tour guide, we listened attentively to her explanations about the fascinating natural features of the cave. Excitement rippled through the group as we spotted tiny, hibernating bats hanging from the cave walls. We were strictly warned not to touch them, as waking them could disturb their slumber (though I'm almost certain I saw one fluttering above me!). The tour continued with a climb up three steep flights of stairs, eliciting plenty of "ew!"s and "ah!"s from students gripping the cold, wet railings. Eventually, we gathered in a compact pocket of the cave, sitting on rocks as instructed. We turned off the small, dim lights on our helmets and were plunged into complete darkness, truly understanding the meaning of "pitch black." After an intriguing lesson on the cave's ecosystem, we emerged back into the daylight, marvelling at the vibrant moss adorning the cave walls. Exhausted yet content, we climbed back onto the bus, settling into our seats for the sleepy ride home. It was an unforgettable day filled with adventure, discovery, and memories we'll cherish.

Though the game didn't end in a win, the experience clearly left the players with lasting lessons and memories. We're excited to see how they bounce back in future games!




ARABIC PEN


